BEST PRIVATE SAFARI Little Olarro, Kenya

Olarro - the Masai word for buffalo - is a stunning new lodge with breathtaking views over the Mara. Created in the same image as Shompole, its highly regarded sister property, it offers perfect seclusion on a private 40,000-acre conservancy. Little Olarro is a separate house a short distance away from the main lodge, with one master bedroom and one twin. Special activities include helicopter flights and after-dark game drives with night-vision binoculars.

Exclusive use of Little Olarro (sleeps four) costs from about £1,240 a night full board, including drinks, game drives, laundry and transfers, with Journeys by Design (01273 623790; www.journeysbydesign.co.uk).





BEST FOR BUSH LUXURY Lukula, and Singita Grumeti Reserves, Tanzania

The Selous is Africa's biggest game reserve and Lukula lies inside it, a former hunting concession; visitors (no more than eight at a time) have 470 square miles of bush to themselves. The camp itself is set on the banks of the Luwegu River. Singita Grumeti Reserves is a private reserve the size of the Masai Mara; with three extraordinary lodges, it's the best place to witness the annual wildebeest migration. *Seven nights at Lukula, from £3,750 a person full board, including flights, game drives and local guides; a seven-night safari, including six nights full board at Singita Grumeti Reserve, costs from £4,965 a person, including flights, transfers and all activities; both with Bailey Robinson (01488 689700; www.baileyrobinson.com).*
